What is going on in school?




Brooke and Grayson in EYFS said... "We have been making masks for the Gingerbread Man when we read the story. And we wrote the story ourselves, we changed bits of the story. I changed to him being on a chicken and then the gingerbread man hopped in the tree (Brooke). They were really long stories. I like running around outside and being in the construction area where you dig things up."

Maisy and Brody in year 1 said ... "We made bird feeders so we could help the

birds to eat in winter because they can't find any food. We used string and pine cones to make them and we could mush up bananas to make the seeds stick to them. We are learning about United Kingdom and that there are 4 countries."

Theodore and Cherry in year 2 said... "Our topic is Titanic and we have been writing about our trip to Sea City when we saw bits from the Titanic. We looked at different people who were on the boat. On one of the pictures you can see that one of the funnels is fake but in the photo you can see a dot of a person at the top trying to climb out. We learnt that it nearly crashed into another boat before it sank and some people thought it had been blown up by a submarine. We are now writing exciting stories about Samson, a mouse who slept in the boilers of the Titanic trying to get to New York."

Evie and Isaac in year 3 said... "We made up dragons and then we have been describing them, they could have hard scaly skin, spikey tails, breathing electric fire or soft, fluffy skin under their tails. In groups we made up dragon stories and we had to act them out to everyone in class – the dragons could help people to fix problems. Next week we are going to use these ideas to write our own stories. In geography we have been drawing aerial view maps and using compass points."




Seth and Georgie in year 4 said... "In class, we have been learning about volcanoes and we had to make them out of clay

- we could choose if we wanted to make cinder cone, stratovolcano or shield types. We learnt about the eruption of Pompeii by reading a story about how 2 children survived, where they told us what happened on the day. We wrote our own stories about being at the eruption of Pompeii and my characters managed to escape by sailing away on a ship."




Casey and Grace in year 5 said... "We have loved learning about what is happening in the rainforest and the orangutans that live there. We had to write a persuasive text to convince people to stop damaging the rainforest and help to protect them. In art I loved how we learnt to sketch an Elephant, using step by step to get it accurate. In maths, we are learning about shapes and drawing angles also measuring with a protractor, it can be really tricky. This week in French we learnt about different homes and how to pronounce them the right way."

Joaby and Lecey in year 6 said... "We have been learning about World War II, we went to Milestones Museum to see what life was like then and they taught us how to do a sling if someone was injured. We have learnt about The Blitz we researched bombing, rationing and jobs that people had during the war, then we had the chance to make ration cakes. We also wrote a poem about how it would feel to be

in World War II and built Anderson shelters that had to be really sturdy to see if they would survive a bomb (it was a 2pound weight). In art, we drew the St Pauls Cathedral with chalk to make skylines and played a card game with evacuees (it helps with estimating)."
