


Bramley Bulletin – 27.1.23




What are we reading in school?

Mrs Bellemere says...

The children in EYFS have been looking at a range of books about bodies, different cultures and interests linked to our aspiration of 'passions'. Most recently we have been reading the book 'Rosie Revere, Engineer' by Andrea Beaty. This has inspired some fantastic conversations around what an engineer is and what kind of things they can create. We became inventors in our classes, building and creating different inventions collaboratively. We also talked about resilience and how important it is to not give up and keep trying, just like Rosie in our story. We talked about how it feels when things don't work out or don't go to plan and this led to some fantastic ideas from the children about how we can work together to help each other.




Miss Barrett says...



Year 1 children have been learning more about Australia the past two weeks. They have been reading and retelling the story of 'The Koala who Could' written by Rachel Bright and linking him to our learning behaviour, Resilient Racoon. The children enjoyed writing this story and can't wait to share this with you at parent's evening! They acted out the story using different characters and read with expression and prosody.

The children in year 2 have been reading a non-fiction text about the Titanic, they have looked at a range of vocabulary including the words

frantic, destined, various and preparations to help them to understand the information. We have been reading lots of books in the classroom and rating them out of 5 stars. We have given 4 stars to 'Tooth Fairy in Training' by Michelle Robinson the children liked that the tooth fairy had to check on the teeth of all kinds of animals. We gave 5 stars to 'That's not Funny Bunny' by Bethany Rose Hines, the children really enjoyed the rhyming in this book and it had a lovely message about being true to yourself rather than trying to show off because you are wonderful as you are.



Miss Denham says...




The children in year 3 are enjoying reading 'The Boy who Grew Dragons' by Andy Shepherd. They have been enthralled by the book and are eager to read each chapter so they can learn what mishaps our character will encounter – when dragons are growing in his garden! The children are learning to read texts more fluently and show character's emotions through their expression. They are beginning to use the context from a sentence in order to allow them to determine the meaning of new words. We have also been trying to use details that the author has included to help us infer and imagine what the characters might be feeling or thinking.



Bramley Church of England Primary

This term in Year 4, we have been looking at 'The Firework-Maker's Daughter' by Phillip Pullman. The children have really engaged with the adventures of the main character, Lila during our class reading sessions at the end of the day and are desperate to find out what will happen next. During our reading sessions, the children are working on improving their fluency and learning when to pause in a text so that their reading flows more naturally. The children are looking at words in a sentence and using their strategies to work out their meaning, they are becoming great vocabulary detectives!

Miss Meads says...



This term in Year 5, the children have been looking at the book 'Running Wild' by Michael Morpurgo. They have been using their prediction skills to make educated guesses as to where the story will take them as well as using their skimming and scanning skills to retrieve key information. The children have also been working hard on their inference skills, inferring how the main character is feeling at each point in the story after being lost in the jungle after a tsunami hits! In writing, the children have been using a range of Year 5 skills such as prepositional phrases to write detailed and atmospheric setting descriptions of the rainforest.

Over the past few weeks in Year 6, the children have been reading 'Holes' by Louis Sachar. They have enjoyed getting to know the main character

Stanley, and the bad luck that seems to follow him through his life, all thanks to the 'curse' the family believe was put on his grandfather and his ancestors. They have used their inference skills to understand more about characters and why they may have been given particular nicknames as well as discussing the authors language choice and explaining why they think particular words and phrases have been used. After learning about the yellow spotted lizards from the text, the children have written non chronological reports about their own fictional lizards, thinking about their appearance, how they defend themselves, their habitats and diets and much more! Moving forward, they will be creating their own survival guides for Camp Greenlake, where they will adopt a more informal tone as they write as Stanley himself.



as the Book Fair have given us £5 vouchers to give away! The following children were lucky enough to win a voucher to spend on their own book at the fair next week.



We will also be looking at the types of stories authors like to write: developing children's understanding of genres and encouraging them to try different styles.
