
I hope you enjoy hearing about what we've been reading:

These past two weeks we have continued to look at Aspiration 1 – Where do I belong in my community and the wider world through exploring books about different abilities. This week's book focus was about George Webster who has Down's Syndrome. We talked about how everyone is different and can do different things. We looked at pictures of George and discussed how when he was growing in his Mummy's tummy he got 'extra ingredients' which was why he found it hard to talk and used talking hands, and why he struggled to run. The children are really enjoying learning about different disabilities this half term and are regularly asking to read more books around this topic and watch events in the paralympics.




Miss Barrett says...



In the last few weeks, Year 1 have started a new class book 'Fairy Tales' by Terry Jones. The book includes lots of short fairy tale stories with features such as a bad character, a good character, a problem and a happy ending. Some of the stories are funny and some of the stories are very silly, one of the stories was about a corn dolly who moaned and moaned and moaned! The children have enjoyed making links to other fairy tales they know including The Three Little Pigs and Jack and the Beanstalk. They have created their own silly stories in their class thrive sessions where they have to take turns and listen to their friends to elaborate on the story, characters and settings.

In Year 2, we have had a Roald Dahl focus with continuing to read Fantastic Mr Fox in groups, there has been lots of interesting vocabulary such as blighter, lousy and crafty. As a class we have been enjoying James and the Giant Peach. All of the children are really growing in independence to show us how they can think through what they have read to answer questions clearly. We have been using the book 'The Storm Whale' by Benji Davies to inspire our writing, focussing on the sequence of events in a story that has a problem to be solved. The children are using this story to write their own with a different sea creature washing up after a storm.






This term in Year 3 our Class reader this term is "The Royal Rabbits of London" by Santa Montefiore and Simon Sebag Montefiore, it follows the adventures of a timid rabbit called Shylo who sets out on an important quest to protect the Queen at Buckingham Palace. The children have loved us reading this to them and are always asking for more of the story. We have focused our writing on the story book "The King Who Banned the Dark" by Emily Haworth-Booth. The children particularly liked this text as it explored the consequences of taking actions without thinking through the results, which also linked to our focus of wisdom in collective worship this term. They wrote a variety of stories covering topics such as banning teachers, homework and parents.






In Year 4, the children begged to continue with the book by Kieran Larwood as our class read and so we have continued to follow Podkin and his siblings on his adventures. Podkin, Paz and Pook are on the run from the evil Gorm who are after the children and their magical dagger Starclaw. In our reading sessions, we have been looking at books with a link to our topic and have read extracts from the Animals of Farthing Wood. This half term, we have focused on understanding the texts by ensuring we can work out the meanings of unknown words in context and discussing our understanding as we read. We have worked on asking questions of the text to help further our understanding, then going back and finding clues for the answers.

Mrs Hanson says...

This term, children in Year 5 are reading the novel by Joan Aitken, it is a historical book that fits in with their monarchy topic. It has been wonderful for the children to see described the luxury that the 'upper classes' live in behind closed doors while the threatening wolves are at the door. We have also been enjoying a non-fiction book all about King Charles III. This book has helped the children look closely at how information is presented and explained to the reader. In their writing, the children have been investigating the events surrounding the Gun Powder Plot to blow up Parliament and King James. Using a range of formal writing skills, they have then turned the events into a news report.





In Year 6, the children are enjoying the novel 'Children of the Quick Sand' by Efua Traoré this term. It is a fantasy, adventure book set in Nigeria to fit with our topic of Amazing Africa. It has been fascinating to look in more detail at some of the cultural references and use google to show us images to help us to picture what the author is describing. We have also been using the picture book 'The Island' by author and illustrator Armin Greder as our inspiration for writing. We have created newspaper reports using a range of skills but also choosing our language and ideas carefully to show bias towards the new people on the island. The children have also enjoyed looking at different characters' viewpoints in the book by writing diaries from certain perspectives.

Sporting Events

On Thursday, Mr Devon took our year 5 and 6 tag rugby team to Oakley Junior school to play in the Sparkling Rugby cup. This is the second part of the rugby calendar where all of the teams who came second in the local area matches play against each other. Our team played 7 matches with incredibly close score lines in each one. In one match in particular, it was as though our team was taking it in turns to score a try! As ever, Mr Devon was so pleased with the children's efforts and team spirit – it has been a great season for them all.
