## What is Forest School?

"An inspirational process that offers children, (young people and adults) regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence through hands-on learning in a woodland environment" O'Brien & Murray (2008).

### **Forest School Principles**

Principle 1: Forest School is a long-term process of frequent and regular sessions in a woodland or natural environment, rather than a one-off visit. Planning, adaptation, observations and reviewing are integral elements of Forest School.

Principle 2: Forest School takes place in a woodland or natural wooded environment to support the development of a relationship between the learner and the natural world.

Principle 3: Forest School aims to promote the holistic development of all those involved, fostering resilient, confident, independent and creative learners

Principle 4: Forest School offers learners the opportunity to take supported risks appropriate to the environment and to themselves.

Principle 5. Forest School is run by qualified Forest School practitioners who continuously maintain and develop their professional practice.

Principle 6. Forest School uses a range of learner-centred processes to create a community for development and learning

### Why move the lessons to the forest?

#### **Classroom Culture**

- Told the information
- Reading about topics
- Physical distance from others
- Limitations
- The expected
- Intellectual development
- Physical inactivity

#### Outdoor Classroom Culture

- Discover the information themselves through investigation
- Experiencing topics first hand and relating them to real life situations
- Working in collaboration with others
- Testing one's own limits and learning what is safe
- The unexpected
- Multi- Sensory/ Whole child development
- Physical development

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## How will you keep my child as safe as possible at Forest School?

-High staff : child ratios

- -Forest School trained staff
- -Secure site
- -Children learn rules by games & songs
- -Children involved in risk assessment
- -Safe practise for tool use
- -All activities have a risk benefit assessment
- -Staff are first aid trained
