We cannot thank our school community enough for your generous harvest donations. The table outside the hall had a huge collection that grew and grew over the last week. The House Captains helped to load up the car and we took a

whopping 327kg of 'food' to the Basingstoke Foodbank. They calculate that this amounts to the equivalent to nearly 700 'meals'.

New PE Uniform...

It is absolutely lovely to see so many children sporting our new hoodies for PE. They look so good and help us to continue to look smart on PE days.

We develop strong core muscles for writing by having 'tummy writing time' and kneeling for posture. Children will often write like this during phonics time and independent tasks.








Bramley Church of England Primary

Year 5...


