High attendance is important for children to achieve the best they can

- Confidence children who attend every day will know the routines, know the consistent expectations, have worked through every step of the learning, giving them greater confidence.
- Friendships when children are frequently absent friendships move on, this then makes it very difficult to 'slot back in' when they are in school. Building and maintaining friendships takes consistency.
- Missed skills it will be hard for children to achieve their best results if there are gaps in their learning.
- Learning is hard when a child returns to school the class will be continuing their learning from the day before making the task harder and puts the absent child at an immediate disadvantage.

Many people think that the odd day off here and there does not matter, but even these odd days can have an impact on a child's learning.

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All of this can become a negative cycle – missing a day or two makes coming back even harder.

The vast majority of our parents do not need to worry about this as your children are in school learning when they can be.

Attendance letters...

At parent's evenings, we regularly share children's current attendance but the vast majority of families do not receive attendance letters from school. This is because the children are in school over 90% of the days.

If attendance falls below 90%, this is when we really need to work with families to ensure children attend school regularly.

Attendance of below 90% is classed as persistently absent. This is an average of one day off every two weeks.
